Newspaperboys Visit Rome, Area Saturday

More than 370 newspaperboys and their supervisors will be feted here Saturday in observance of International Newspaper Boy Day.

The boys from 25 cities will be given a tour of Griffiss AFB, a demonstration by State Police of their bloodhound tracking dogs and a sky tour in a Mohawk BAC-Jet.

Thomas A. Gallagher, circulation director of the Binghamton Press, and Howard F. Peglow, Sentinel circulation director, are co-chairman of the event sponsored by the New York State Circulation Managers Association.

Welcoming the carriers will be Edward J. Lynch, circulation manager of the Olean Times Herald and president of the State Circulation Association.

To Meet at Sentinel The boys will meet at the Sentinel building and board chartered buses to Griffiss at 10:15 a.m. They will be met by Miss Addie Mouser, of the base Information Office. At 10:45 a.m., Trooper F. E. Nichols, under the command of Maj. Raymond M. Rassmusen, Troop D. Oneida, will demonstrate the tracking ability of the bloodhounds.

Prior to the 1 p.m. tour of the base, the carriers will be served lunch at the Air Force mess.

At 2 p.m., tours from the Oneida County Airport will begin. The half-hour flights will cover areas of upstate New York.
